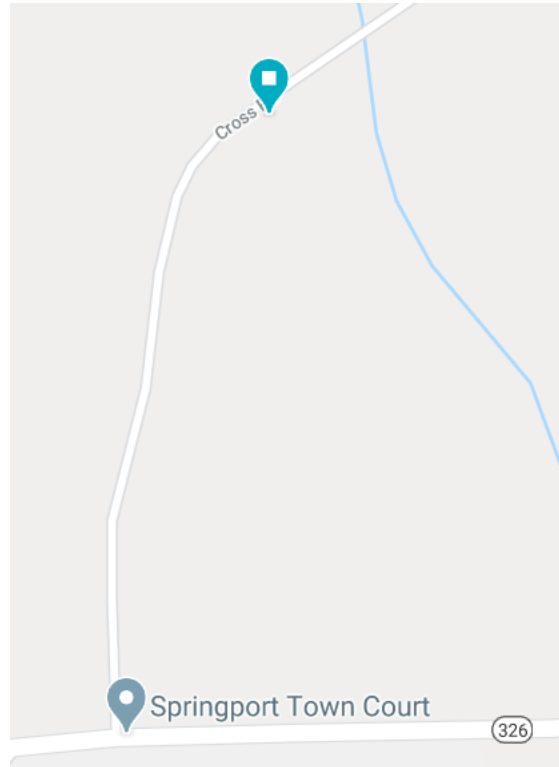


Lowry Cemetery, Cross Road, Springport, Cayuga County, New York

About a half mile north of Route 326 on the east side of the road at the top of a hill. This cemetery is maintained nicely, has a flag pole, and fake owl on a stake with what looks like a broken headstone at the base. Three stones are standing, however, they are not original.

*James Lowry: 11 PA Regt Rev War 1753-1832

*Cornelius Stout: Maj NJ Militia Rev War 1741-1820

*These appear to be the headstones Mr. Chamberlain received from the Veteran's Administration.

A large stone in the middle of the plot reads the following:

Lowry, James: Served in PA Militia; d. Apr 13, 1832 age 79

Lowry, Joanna Stout: b. Hunterdon NJ; d. July 10, 1846 age 79

Stout, Cornelius: Maj. Hunt. Co. Militia; d. 1816 ca age 80

Stout, Eleanor Longstreet; d. ca 1811 age ca 74

Lowry (First Wife, named in deed) d. ca 1802

Lowry, daughter (believed deformed) d. ca 1801

Lowry, (baby)

Johnson Stout came to Hibiscus Harbor area quite early. His father Cornelius took over his land and bought more next to James Lowry who married his daughter Joanna. The Major Cornelius Stout cashiered from a long time second-in-command of the active Hunterton Co. Militia had a mother named Joanna Johnson. He countermanded an order from Col. Chamberlain at the battle of Springfield, NJ. He was not court-martialed by the Governor until many months later and was supported by a petition of most of the officers. Both he and Col. Chamberlain were cashiered in 1780. Col. Chamberlain's widow got a pension later and they claimed that the court-martial had been set aside; but only a record of the court-martial is available at the NJ archives. There is overwhelming proof that the cashiered Major came here and the VA gave me a Revolutionary grave marker for both Stout and Lowry.
